BLESSED PEACE

A haunting karanga welcomed us to a dawn blessing of Pukeahu National War Memorial park

on 25 March. The Carillon and Australian Memorial were stark and beautiful, lit against a clear dark sky. Many locals joined a thousand people to be the first entering the new park. We followed the blessing of the four winds and corners, unveiling tangata whenua gardens and the statue of Hinerangi - a sorrowing woman representing those waiting at home.

We finished with breakfast in Mt Cook





the Minister of Arts, Culture & Heritage, the Mayor of Wellington, and Sandy McCallum the Principal of Mt Cook School. The construction of the park has seen a great linkage between the school, MCH and Memorial Park Alliance, with many visits and discussions about the construction work, the significance of the park and first-hand experience of a site of national significance.

> Then followed the formal park opening on 18 April, and dedicating the Australian memorial on the 20th, with two PMs and plenty of pomp. The Great War Exhibition started a 4-year run in the former Dominion Museum, and sound and light projected our hearts and hopes onto the cold slab exteriors

of the museum and carillon. Mt Cook is the focus this year

for Anzac commemorations, and the glorious tones of the carillon will again float from our sky. MARY HUTCHINSON

As the Governor-General reminded us, Pukeahu is a sacred hill and, for many reasons, "is an appropriate place in our capital city to commemorate the sacrifice of those who served during times of war and conflict. Pukeahu, more than anywhere else, reminds us how precious peace is to us all."

The street parade on 24 April culminated at the park, leaving the dawn and national services of commemoration on Anzac day to say it all. Lest We Forget, and congratula-

Mt Cook Preschool stands where there was once a school pool in the grounds of Mt Cook School. The Preschool takes 3- and 4-year-olds, and is a feeder preschool for Mt Cook primary. There are lots of linkages between the two schools; the school librarian reads to the pre-schoolers once a week, Mt Cook School students practise peer-reading to the littlies, and in return are proudly shown the preschool's collection of outdoor bugs and creepy crawlies. By the time the preschoolers make the move to Mt Cook School they are very comfortable in their new surroundings.

One of the jewels in the crown of the Preschool is that most of the teachers speak at least one other language. Teachers are often called upon to translate for the Preschool community, or sometimes for Mt Cook School. The sharing of cultural values is second nature. As is the Preschool's focus on sustainability - the children learn about composting, worm farms and insect lifecycles. The Preschool has embraced technology for sharing the children's learning with parents. Teachers use an online resource called Storypark to build e-profiles, uploading children's pictures and stories, which parents can share online with other family members.

Mt Cook Preschool is community-run, has a small roll of around 24 children, and is open until 2:45 in the afternoon. Prospective students and their whanau are welcome to call in. HOUSING NZ'S NEIGHBOURLY DAY

Mt Cook Mobilised was involved with the clearing and planting of more than 60 donated native plants with some coming from Friends of Owhiro Stream (for which, many thanks). These were planted on the bank above the Hargreaves St car park.

Further planting of the banks is planned to take place at a later date and maybe some more fruit trees provided. 6
